We gladly embrace this and all other Occasions to assure your Majesty, that the entire Satisfaction we receive from every signal Blessing, which attends your Majesty and your august House, proceeds from our Gratitude and Affection to your Person and Government, to which we are zealously attached by the strongest Bands that can unite us, the Protection of our Religious and Civil Establishment under a Prince, who upon all Occasions has been graciously pleased to declare his unalterable Resolution of preserving the just Rights and Liberties of all his Subjects.

May your Majesty long live to enjoy the Fruits of your paternal Care for the Good and Welfare of your People in the Hearts and Affections of all your Subjects; and may every Branch of your illustrious Family be influenced by your Majesty's great Example, to contribute to the Support of those Laws, which the Wisdom and Justice of your Reign have provided for the Security of a free and happy People.

Your Royal Care to advance the Welfare and Prosperity of your Kingdoms, justly demands from all your Subjects the most grateful Returns of Duty and Loyalty, and engages them to take the utmost Satisfaction at an Event which so nearly concerns your Majesty as the late happy Increase of your august Family. But we are under peculiar Obligations on this Occasion to take Part in the publick Joy, on account of the many distinguish'd Favours conferred upon us, and the gracious Assurances your Majesty has frequently given us of your Favour and Protection.

We cannot sufficiently express the Pleasure we take in the enlarg'd Prospect we have, that the Blessings we enjoy during your Majesty's auspicious Reign will be continued to our latest Posterity, through a long Succession of Princes, form'd after your great Example, to be Protectors of our Civil Rights, Patrons of Learning and Virtue, and Defenders of our establish'd Church.

WE your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects, the Gentlemen of the several Grand Juries sworn and charged to enquire for your Majesty, and for the Body of the County of Middlesex in your Majesty's Court of King's Bench at Westminster, humbly beg Leave to approach your Royal Person with Hearts full of Joy for the Increase of your Majesty's Royal Family by the Birth of a Son to the Prince of Wales.

We are so truly sensible that the Preservation of our Religion, Laws and Liberties, depends on the Continuance of your Majesty's Royal Family among us, that we should be wanting to ourselves, as well as in Duty to your Majesty, if we did not congratulate on this.
