Hague, February 14, N. S.

BY a Courier from Turin, arrived here last Saturday, we have Advices from Provence of the 28th past, N. S. that upon the News of Marshal Belleisle's Motions, General Brown had recalled all his Parties; and withdrawn from Antibes what Troops were not absolutely necessary for keeping the Place closely blocked up; and had taken an advantageous Post, and intrenched himself behind the Ciagne, in order to wait the Enemy there. The Austrians were then Masters of the open Country between the Mountains and the City of Genoa; but had not made any immediate Attempt upon the City itself, their heavy Artillery not being then come up. The Night before last, Twenty Transports arrived at Helvoet from England, with the first Division of the Troops designed for the Army in Brabant. According to this Day's Letters from Paris, M. de Puyfieux was so far recovered, that, on the 9th he had set up a Couple of Hours. M. du Theil was to set out immediately for Breda; whither Count Waffenaer, who has been here since M. de Puyfieux's Departure, from thence, designs to return on Thursday next. The French Post which is come in this Afternoon, has brought the positive News of General Brown's having abandoned the Ciagne, and retreated behind another

little River something farther backward. The French pretend that he had actually repassed the Var.

Admiralty Office, February 10.

On the 5th Instant his Majesty's Ship the Eagle, commanded by Capt. Rodney, arrived in Plymouth Sound, having on board 340 Prisoners, who belong'd to a French Privateer called the Bellona of Nantz, of 36 Carriage and 12 Swivel Guns, taken the 2d Instant by the Edinburgh, Nottingham, and Eagle: She had been out forty Days, and taken only one Brig from Boston. The Prize is arrived at Portsmouth.
