HE King of Denmark goes this Afternoon to Sora, about nine Danish Miles from hence, in order to be prefent To-morrow at the folemn Inftitution of an Academy lately erected there, or rather reftored, for the Education of young Gentlemen in Exercises, Arts, and Sciences; after which his Danish Majesty proposes to make a further Progress into the Country, so as to return hither before the 3d of next Month. The Queen of Denmark being in a fine Way of Recovery, the Queen Dowager returned Yesterday to pass the Remainder of the Summer at Hirfcholm, Bareith, July 26, N.S. The Diet of Franconia having taken a favourable Refolution with Respect to the Affociation of the Anterior Circles, Baron Widman, the Imperial Envoy, and Mr. Burrish, his Britannick Majesty's Minister, are arrived here from Nuremberg. Those Ministers have already had their Audiences of the Margrave our Sovereign; who, with the Princess Royal his Confort, is lately returned from Carlsbadt. Dresden, July 29, N.S. Letters from Turin mention, that the King of Sardinia had refolved to take the Field, and was fetting out for Coni, to put himself at the Head of his Army, which, it is faid, will confift, between Auftrians and Sardinians, of an Hundred Battalions and twenty Thousand Horse.

It is now faid, that only three of these new Battalions are gone to Bergenop-Zoom, where it is supposed they arrived either last Night, or early this Morning; and that the remaining Part of the Detachment is to continue in the Neighbourhood of Breda. Yefterday's Letters from Bergen-op-Zoom agree, that the French made but very little Progress in their Attacks, either against the Town or against the Fort; and that their Fire had been for these last five Days much inferior to that of the Town. Helvoetsluys, August 5, N. S. Past One There was all the Night from Saturday to Yesterday the smartest Firing heard from Bergenop-Zoom that has been yet; but fince Yesterday Morning at Seven, we have not heard one Cannon, which makes some apprehend that Fort Rover is taken; although there is a Report by a Skipper just come in, that the French have abandoned the Siege. Hague, August 8, N.S. By Advices from Bergen-op-Zoom we learn, that the Garrifon continue in good Spirits, and feem determined to defend themselves to the last Extremity; that the French go on very flowly in their Attack against Fort Rover, but were got in four different Places very near the Pallifadoes belonging to the Cover'd Way of the Town; that 80 Volunteers had flipp'd behind one of the Enemy's Batteries of four Twenty-four Pounders, and had nailed them up without the Loss of a Man; that the Enemy had replaced them with two Twelve Pounders, which the Night following were attacked again by the fame Volunteers, and brought off fafe into the Town; and that M. Lowendahl had, got the French Officer, that commanded there, hanged next Day upon the Battery. Yesterday Morning the Prince of Orange received an Exprefs from Bergen-op-Zoom, with Advice, that on Saturday Night the French, after springing a Mine under the Salient Angle of the Covered Way facing Coehorn's Bastion, had attacked the fame with fuch Vigour, that they forced themfelves into the Covered Way, but were foon repulfed with great Slaughter, and the Lofs of near L South States 1500 Men killed upon the Spot. During the Time

Rotterdam, August 4, N. S. A Letter dated Yesterday from Bergen-op-Zoom, fays, that the French have made two unfuccessful Attacks upon Fort Rover, and that at that Time all was well both in the Town and Lines. Another Letter from that Neighbourhood has it, that the Corps commanded by General Swattzenberg had Orders to halt between Oudenbos and Rukveen. Hague, August 4, N. S. The Troops under the Command of Lieutenant General de Swartzenberg arrived at Teteringen near Breda last Tuesday: From thence they marched to Oudenbos, where they were to be met by M, Buymania with all the Horse that happened to be

Time of the Assault the Garrison sprung a Mine that blew up two whole Companies of Grenadiers of the Regiment of Normandie, and some Part of the faid Regiment. The Lofs of the Garrifon amounted in all to 350 Men. All Accounts agree that the French Troops are very fickly. The three Regiments that were marching up to reinforce the Garrison were ordered to ftop at a Place called Blaeuwe Sluys. Laft Friday the States of Holland unanimoully refolved to raise a Body of 10,000 Militia, to be composed of fo many Free Companies of a hundred Men, which are to be raifed according to a determined Repartition for every Town and City of this Province. The fame Resolution contains befides an Exhortation to all Magistrates to see that the Burghers, in their respective Districts, be regularly exercised, and taught the Use of their Arms.
