Y Letters received by the Gibraltar Man of War, from Vice-Admiral Boscawen, dated off Louisburgh, the 22d of June trys, there is an Account, That on the roth of that Month, the Alcide, a French Man of War of 64 Guns and 480 Men, commanded by M. Hoquart, and the Lys, commanded by M. Lageril, pierced for 64 Guns, but mounting only 22, and having 8 Companies of Land Forces on board, being separated from the French Squadron, sommanded ted from the French Squadron, commanded by M. Bois de Lamothe, fell in with the English Fleet off the Banks of Newfoundland, and that a Skirmish happened between the said French Men of War and His Majesty's Ships the Dunkirk and Defiance, in which the Alcide and the Lys were taken. The French Ship the Dauphin Royal, which had been in Company with the two abovementioned, disappeared in the Fogg.
