

Lord Chamberlain's Office, Sept. 12, 1757.

Orders for the Change of the Mourning for the late Dowager Queen of Prussia on Sunday next, the 18th Instant, viz.

The Men to continue in Black full trimmed, and to wear coloured Swords and Buckles.

The Ladies to wear black Silk or Velvet, coloured Ribbons, Fans, and Tippetts.

Whitehall, September 6, 1757.

Whereas it has been humbly represented to the King, that some malicious Person or Persons did on Tuesday Evening, about Nine of the Clock of the Twenty Ninth Day of August last, set Fire to the Coach House and Barn of Samuel Ruggles, Esq; in Becking in the County of Essex, whereby the same, and a great Quantity of Corn and Wool, was burnt and destroyed: His Majesty, for the better discovering and bringing to Justice the Persons concerned in the said wicked Crime, is hereby pleased to promise His most gracious Pardon to any one of them (except the Person who actually set the said Coach House and Barn on Fire) who shall discover his or her Accomplice, or Accomplices therein, so that he, she, or they may be apprehended and convicted thereof.
