ed. And if French Measures are to be judged of by common Rules, we should also suppose, that the Blow, given to their Fleet by your Majetty's Ships, under the brave Admiral Boscawen, will make them lay afide their boafted Scheme of invading Britain.

At the same Time permit us, Great Sir, with the most profound Deference and Submission, to re-present, That this Scheme of an Invasion, however desperate, and therefore never attempted by Louis the Fourteenth, or his Ministers, except when the Change of Government in Britain was recent, and the People unhappily divided; which, thank God, is no more the Case, may notwithstanding be at-tempted at this Time, the French being bassled in all their other Defigns. And as it is also possible, that some few of their Ships may escape the Vigilance of your Majesty's Navy; and impossible for your Majesty, however anxious for the Safety of your People, to have your Ships and Troops station ed round every Part of your extensive Coast; we, in such Situation, apprehend it to be incumbent on all your Majesty's Subjects, from their Allegiance and for Self-preservation, not to remain in a State of Inaction, but to be ready to join in repelling the Invaders: Such in particular we can, on good Grounds, affirm, is the Voice of the Inhabitants of this populous Country, who wait, with Imparience, an Order to put themselves in Readiness.

Notwithstanding of this our Zeal, we find, that the Want and Disuse of Arms renders us at present in a Manner incapable to be of any real Use to ourselves, or to the Publick, should the French make a Descent on these Islands. And for these Reasons most humbly pray, That your Majesty will be pleased to give such Orders for patting this Country in some Posture of Desence, as your Majesty, in your

great Wisdom, shall think proper.

That your Majesty may be long preserved for the Good of your People, and the Support of the Protestant Religion, and of the Liberties of Europe: And that all your Descendants may inherit those Princely Virtues, with which you are distinguished, is the constant Prayer of your Majesty's most dutiful and loyal Subjects.

To the King's most Excellent Majesty,

Allow as further, with the greatest Submission, to lay before your Majelly the defenceless Since of the whole Firth of Cryde, in the Trade to wrote many Thousands of your faithful Schjefts and interested. And to pray in the most humble stanner, that your Majesty will be pleased to give such Orders for Desence of the said Firth, against our Enemies, as the Exigence of the Times will admit. And also, for putting the Inhabitants of this Burgh in such Posture of Defence, as your Majesty, in your great Wildom, shall think proper.

That your Majesty may have continued Succession against your Enemies; and long Reign over a free and happy People; and that there may never be wanting of your Royal Line, inheriting your Princely Viscues, to fit upon the Throne of these Realms, is, and shall be the constant Prayer of your Majesty's most faithful Subjects, the Magistrates and Council of your

Burgh of Ayr.
