The QUEEN'S Most Excellent Majesty in Council.

WHEREAS Her Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches have, in pursuance of the provisions of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of Her Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the farther amendment of the church building Acts," duly prepared and laid before Her Majesty in Council a representation, bearing date the twenty-fourth day of November one thousand eight hundred and forty-six, in the words following, that is to say :

"Your Majesty's Commissioners for building new churches beg leave humbly to represent to your Majesty, that, having taken into consideration all the circumstances of the parishes of Gargrave and Kirkby Malhamdale, in the west riding of the county of York, and within the diocese of Ripon, it appears to them to be expedient to unite and consolidate certain contiguous parts of the said parishes, and to form the same into one consolidated chapelry for the consecrated church, called Saint Peter's, situate at Coniston Cold, in the said parish of Gargrave, under the provisions

of the ninth section of an Act, passed in the session of Parliament holden in the eighth and ninth years of your Majesty's reign, intituled "An Act for the further amendment of the church building Acts;" and that such consolidated chapelry should be named, "The Consolidated Chapelry of Coniston," and consist of the township of Coniston Cold and parts of the townships of Eshton and Gargrave, in the parish of Gargrave, also of part of the townships of Otterburn and Airton, in the said parish of Kirkby Malhamdale, and that such consolidated chapelry should be bounded as follows, that is to say :

"On the west by the parish of Long Preston; on the south by the township of Banknewton, in the said parish of Gargrave; on the east by the boundary line which separates the townships of Coniston Cold and Gargrave, as far as the point at the southern end of the strip of plantation below Bell Busk Mill, where it intersects the boundary of the township of Coniston Cold; from which point it proceeds northerly, up the eastern side of the said plantation and of a watercourse, to the point where such watercourse joins the boundary line of the parish of Kirkby Malhamdale; it then follows the boundary line, in a south easterly and north easterly direction, to the south western corner of Windsor Copy; it then pro-
