

and in any case, in conjunction with the Tutor or Tutors to maintain discipline and good order amongst the members of the College *in statu pupillari*, especially in respect of attendance and behaviour at the College Chapel.

If the Dean is not in Holy Orders, a Chaplain shall be appointed by the Master with the approval of a majority of the Governing Body to conduct the Chapel Services for such period as they may determine.

A majority of the Governing Body shall have power to remove the Chaplain.

The Dean, and the Chaplain, if there be one, shall receive such stipend as the Governing Body may from time to time determine.
